CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 7:04 P.M. by Supervisor Chockley at 8350 Main Street.

Trustee Otto provided a brief invocation and led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

ADOPT AGENDA

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Beliger supported, that the agenda be adopted with the addition of the Washtenaw County Road Commission Dust Control Package as item 9.5.

Board members discussed concerns about items being added late to agendas.

Motion carried 6-1 on a roll call vote, Dockett opposed.

FIRST CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Mary Devlin, 9211 Brookside, Brad Cousino, Planning Commissioner, 2860 Tepeyac Hill Drive, Michael Laird, 7628 Oliver Street, Chris Salata, 2920 Tepeyac Hill Drive, Doug Nelson, 5314 Walnut Creek, Henry Russell, 2863 E. Joy Road, Steven Safranek, 5359 Hilltop Court, and Kathleen Bays, 13872 Edenderry, Green Oak Township, objected to adoption of the proposed marijuana ordinance.

Dana Forrester, 9255 Lakewood Drive, Adam Olney, Udo Huff, 6431 Whitmore Lake Road, and Stacy Sloan, 9972 N. Main Street spoke in favor of the marijuana ordinance.

Wayne Davidson, 8015 Coyle Road, provided information about the business of growing marijuana.

Mary Devlin, 9211 Brookside, and Craig Warburton, 450 W. Joy Road objected to the construction of a sewer retention basin. Udo Huff, 6431 Whitmore Lake Road, asked about

the proposed Wastewater Treatment Plant expenditures listed on the agenda.

Soamer Jamil, 52 Barker Road, objected to the sale of 75 Barker Road due to the loss of public parking.

BOARD MEMBER RESPONSE

Board members made comments on information provided by members of the public in favor of and in opposition to allowing marijuana sales. They also answered questions posed by members of the public, including that the Wastewater Treatment Plant expenditure requests are in the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), and there is a plan for the North Village Park.

Dockett asked for information about the mailbox, street sweeping, Lt. Greene, 75 Barker Road, and the sewage retention basin. Zelenock thanked the Girl Scouts and the others who helped clean up the Community Garden and thanked Chockley and the other volunteers who worked on the successful grant application for improvements to the Community Center.

TOWNSHIP MANAGER REPORT

Regarding the Wastewater Treatment Plan retention basin, Aynes said if the Board approves construction it will not be built for at least a couple years, the Township's bond advisor and bond attorney are not paid unless bonds are sold, and none of the recent sewer rate increase will be used for that project. He urged the public to let the Board know their priorities for the next fiscal year budget.

Board members discussed what information is necessary to allow them to decide on the retention basin.

CORRESPONDENCE AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

Chockley noted the Master Plan Draft review period extends until May 5th. Board members thanked Chockley and Marta Larson for making known the availability of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding for the Community Center and Tammy Averill and Jennifer Carlisle for their work on the successful grant application.

Beliger reported a complaint from a citizen about people sitting in a car at the Jennings Road athletic field smoking marijuana. Chockley noted a police officer will be making a presentation to the Board regarding the effect of marijuana use in communities at the next meeting.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Board members made three corrections.

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Chick supported, that the minutes of the March 26, 2019, regular Board Meeting be approved as amended. Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

ACTION AGENDA ITEMS

I. Review Marijuana Ordinance

The Board discussed options for proceeding, including postponing action until the State publishes its regulations, opting out until that time, opting out completely, extending the sunset clause previously set by the Board, recommending changes for the Planning Commission to make, and discussing the proposal in a joint working session of the Planning Commission and Township Board.

John Jackson, Township Planner with McKenna, reviewed the proposed ordinance, including the uses, zoning districts, and number of permits to be allowed, the approval process (conditional use permit required), and the licensing process.

Board members made comments including concern about operations being in AG-zoned areas which are used mainly residentially, the amount of staff time required for processing applications, the total number of permits that would be allowed, the distance required between marijuana facilities and public uses (schools, religious institutions, etc.), and potential stress placed on the sewer plant. Chick noted the Planning Commission approached this ordinance to mirror regulation of alcohol.

Additional comments from Board members included:

- Strenuous objection to allowing any marijuana facilities in the community due to it being illegal at the federal level and the effect on children and the community as a whole.
- Concern about the processing of applications.
- Concern about allowing facilities in any residential district or the Whitmore Lake district.
- Recommended that the Planning Commission look at the Grand Rapids ordinance.
- Said it should not be approached the same as liquor licenses because most of those require the alcohol to be consumed on-site.
- Said the proposal is extreme for something that has so many unknowns about it,

Chief Wagner said:

- He would prefer to wait for the presentation by the DEA representative scheduled for the next meeting before he comments because he is not an expert on this, and whatever the Board decides the Police Department will enforce the law.
- He would be more concerned if Northfield Township is one of only a few communities in the area that opts in because in that case the marijuana-related calls they already get would increase.
- · He is also concerned about the odor.
- It is not clear who will responsible for inspection of facilities.

▶ Motion: Beliger moved that the Township opt out of allowing any marijuana facilities indefinitely.

Burns said he would prefer an opportunity to prepare a proper amendment to Ordinance 18-62.

Motion withdrawn.

▶ Motion: Beliger moved, Chockley supported, that the Township attorney prepare a proposed amendment to ordinance 18-62 regarding the sunset provision to be provided for the next Board agenda.

Burns said he will prepare two ordinances—for permanent opting out and for an extension of the sunset provision.

Motion carried 6-1 on a roll call vote, Chick opposed.

Chick asked that someone from the City of Ann Arbor be asked to make a presentation at the next Board meeting in addition to the DEA officer.

Motion: Chockley moved, Chick supported, to invite the Planning Commission to the April 23rd Board meeting to discuss the proposed marijuana ordinance. Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

2.

Reaffirm Prior Vote on Ordinance 19-63: Amendments to Zoning Ordinance

▶ Motion: Beliger moved, Chick supported, to reaffirm the prior vote on Ordinance 19-63: Amendments to Zoning Ordinance, sign regulations.

Chockley explained that this action is necessary because publication requirements were not met when it was first approved. Beliger expressed concern that sign limitations are too restrictive based on the temporary sign allowed at 75 Barker Road. Planning consultant John Jackson explained that permanent signs may be much larger. Dockett said he is opposed to most sign restrictions.

Motion carried 4—3 on a roll call vote, Beliger, Dockett, and Zelenock opposed. Ordinance adopted.

Wastewater Treatment Plant Maintenance Requests

Willis noted that the prices listed are firm, not estimates.

- Motion: Chockley moved, Zelenock supported, to approve the Wastewater Treatment Plant maintenance requests:
 - Replace return sludge control valve system for a cost of \$89,319,
 - Replace Scada controls for pump stations for a cost of \$76,525,
 - Replace Main Street pump station force main pipeline for a cost of \$66,300, and
 - Replace Eight Mile Road pump station VFD for a cost of \$15,120.

for a total of \$247,264.

In answer to a question from Dockett, Willis said the funds are in their budget for the current year.

Motion carried 7-0 on a roll call vote.

4. Sale of Two Fire Trucks

 Motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to approve the sale of two fire trucks.
 Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

5. Auctioning of Excess Fire Department Equipment

Motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to approve the auctioning of excess Fire Department equipment.

There was a brief discussion about the details of the auction.

▶ Amended motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to approve the auctioning of excess Fire Department equipment, and to allow it to be thrown away if it does not sell.

Amended motion carried 7-0 on a voice vote.

6. Resignation of Part-time Police Officer Andrea McKahan

 Motion: Chockley moved, Beliger supported, to accept the resignation of Part-time Police Officer Andrea McKahan, Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

7. Pay Raises for Police and Fire Non-Union Employees

- Motion: Manley moved, Chick supported, that Angela Bennett's wage be increased to \$23.68/hour retroactive to July 1, 2018.
 Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.
- ▶ Motion: Chick moved, Chockley supported, that Deputy Chief Bishop's wage be increased from \$22.00/hour to \$23.50/hour retroactive to July 1, 2018. Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.
- ▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Chick supported, that Assistant Chief Steve Lowe's wage be increased from \$20.00/hour to \$21.50/hour retroactive to July 1, 2018. Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.
- ▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Chick supported, that Chief Wagner's salary be increased 4%. Motion carried 6—1 on a roll call vote, Dockett opposed.

In answer to a question from Dockett, Wagner said trial is scheduled to start next week for Sgt. Greene in Livingston County and May $13^{\rm th}$ in Washtenaw County. He said he will keep the Board updated on this.

Wagner also noted that the new fire truck he displayed before the meeting replaces the two trucks being sold.

8. Commercial Realtor Contract for Sale of 75 Barker Road

Motion: Beliger moved, Dockett supported, to accept the exclusive right to sell from Thomas Duke Company.

There was discussion about whether to require retention of the parking area for public use.

Motion withdrawn.

Motion: Beliger moved, Dockett supported, to accept the exclusive right to sell from Thomas Duke Company, with the term of the contract to be six months from the date of signing, excluding Polly Market/Acho Brothers at the \$275,000 listing price.

Motion carried 4—3 on a roll call vote, Zelenock, Chockley, and Chick opposed.

Parks & Recreation Board Requests for Purchases

- Motion: Otto moved, Zelenock supported, to accept the Parks & Recreation Committee not-to-exceed \$2,600 proposal for those items for the community garden as listed in the Board packet.
- Amendment to motion: Zelenock moved, Otto supported, to amend the motion to make sure a shed is allowed on the site and complies with Township ordinances.

Amendment to motion carried 7-0 on a voice vote.

▶ Amended motion: Otto moved, Zelenock supported, to accept the Parks & Recreation Committee not-to-exceed \$2,600 proposal for those items for the community garden as listed in the Board packet, and to make sure a shed is allowed on the site and complies with Township ordinances.

Amended motion carried 5-2 on a voice vote, Beliger and Dockett opposed.

9.5. Washtenaw County Road Commission Dust Control Package

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Zelenock supported, to approve the 2019 Agreement with the Washtenaw County Road Commission for three solid applications of contract brine on all local certified gravel or limestone roads within the Township at an estimated cost to Northfield Township of \$27,532.

Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

10. First Draft of 2019-2020 Budget

Chockley referred to her April 9th memo.

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Zelenock supported, to include a 2.8% cost of living raise for all non-union employees in the 2019-20 budget.

Dockett said he prefers merit raises over cost-of-living raises. There was a discussion about whether this would be retroactive for 2018-19. Aynes said he will be bringing a proposal regarding retroactive pay for the current fiscal year on the next agenda.

Motion carried 5—2 on a roll call vote, Dockett and Beliger opposed.

There was a brief discussion about road maintenance funding, It was agreed that more detail is needed.

Motion: Beliger moved, Otto supported, to renew the Township Manager's contract with no raise for two years. Motion carried 4—3 on a roll call vote, Manley, Zelenock, and Chockley opposed.

Aynes noted this needs to be an official offer prepared by the Township's labor attorney for him to respond to.

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Manley supported, to include in the 2019-20 budget the purchase of a car from the Police Department at red book price for use by the Code Enforcement Officer, not to exceed \$10,000.

Beliger said she would prefer to continue paying the Code Enforcement Officer mileage and the \$10,000 be dedicated to road maintenance.

Motion failed 3—4 on a roll call vote, Otto, Zelenock, Dockett, and Beliger opposed.

Chockley recessed the meeting for five minutes.

▶ Motion: Zelenock moved, Beliger supported, to remove the \$60,000 proposed for the kiosk and designate it for road improvements.

Motion carried 7—0 on a roll call vote.

There was discussion about other items to potentially include in the budget, including design for the lakefront portion of the downtown park. Dockett asked that it be determined whether it will be possible to have a pier in the park.

11. Approve Payment of Open Bills (expected check run date 04-10-2019)

▶ Motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to approve the payment of Open Bills (expected check run date 04-10-2019) for a total of \$133,804.78 from all funds in the Municipal Investment Fund (MIF) account. Motion carried 7—0 on a roll call vote.

12. Accept Check Disbursement Report for Paid Bills (check date from 03-07-2019 to 04-04-2019)

Motion: Chockley moved, Chick supported, to accept the Check Disbursement Report for Paid Bills (check date from 03-07-19 to 04-04-19) for a total of \$940,071.42 from all funds in the Municipal Investment Fund (MIF) account.

In answer to a question from Dockett, Aynes said he confirmed with the Township's insurance agent that a \$1,000 claim will not affect the Township's rate, and the agent is investigating what effect various deductibles would have on the policy cost.

Motion carried 7-0 on a voice vote.

CONSENT AGENDA

 Motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to accept the consent agenda as presented.
 Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

TRUSTEE/LIAISON REPORTS

Chick reported that residents of the Horseshoe Lake Association would like the first opportunity to purchase lots that come up for sale within their community.

Otto asked that the resolution for the \$2,000 to the Ann Arbor Greenbelt fund be on the next agenda.

Chick asked that the Board create an economic development committee to work with the DDA to pursue development in the Township. There was discussion about ways to assist the DDA with this.

Dockett objected to Chockley's proposal to participate in the Redevelopment Ready Communities Program.

 Motion: Chockley moved, Otto supported, to accept the Trustee and Liaison Reports as presented.
 Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

SECOND CALL TO THE PUBLIC

Adam Olney, Whitmore lake, made extensive comments in support of the marijuana ordinance and in support of the work of the DDA.

BOARD MEMBER COMMENTS

Board members thanked those who came to speak and those who remained until the end of a long meeting, said the proposed marijuana ordinance and some other agenda items were not handled well by the Board, asked everyone to support local businesses, and noted there was good feedback in the online survey.

ADJOURNMENT

 Motion: Chick moved, Manley supported, that the meeting be adjourned.
 Motion carried 7—0 on a voice vote.

Assistant Special Agent in Charge Bruce McColley will present the law enforcement experience.


Andrew Sereno and Matthew Kreuger will speak from a business owner and provider experience.

Bruce R. McColley Assistant Special Agent in Charge Detroit, Michigan

Assistant Special Agent in Charge (ASAC) Bruce McColley began his law enforcement career with the Phoenix Police Department after acquiring a Bachelor's Degree in Criminal Justice from Arizona State University. Shortly thereafter, the DEA recruited ASAC McColley to serve along the southwest border. He then worked with federal, state and local law enforcement counterparts to infiltrate, disrupt and dismantle several major international drug trafficking organizations (DTOs) resulting in the prosecution for the seizure of tens of thousands of pounds of marijuana, tons of cocaine, as well as millions of dollars in proceeds, in addition to the arrest and conviction of multiple dozens of DTO members to include corrupt law enforcement officers. ASAC McColley was then reassigned to supervise multiple enforcement groups in Miami, Florida, again focusing on further improving the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement efforts with counterparts. ASAC McColley was subsequently reassigned to DEA HQ where he oversaw operations, shootings and/or misconduct allegations at DEA offices throughout the world, to include; China, Thailand, Afghanistan, Chile, Suriname, Poland, The Hague, France, and Puerto Rico, as well as all 21 domestic divisions. Since reporting to the Detroit Division, ASAC McColley has overseen DEA law enforcement operations throughout the State of Michigan to include the Southeast Michigan Regional Strike Force.

Marijuana Discussion and Presentation by Andrew Sereno and Matthew Kreuger

Speaker Andrew Sereno CEO of Glacier Cannabis and owner of Fresh Forage restaurant will provide information on their organization and medical marijuana in Michigan. He will speak to ordinances and the application process in Sharon Township and the City of Adrian where he has approval for a grow and processing center.

He will defer some of his time, as dictated by the time allotted to the DEA representative, to his partner Matt Kreuger who will address the necessity in differentiating between medical and recreational marijuana for the purpose of the ordinance. He will also comment on the misconceptions of the industry, banking and cash businesses and how regulating cannabis results in less crime and greater control for the community, as well as tax surpluses and the "black market".

MEMORANDUM: Marihuana Proposed Districts, Uses and Permits

Honorable Trustees.

As requested by the Board, Planning Commission has been working to develop zoning regulations and permitting to accommodate medical and recreational marihuana uses in the Township. Planning Commission held a public hearing on March 20, 2019 on the proposed Zoning regulations and voted to send the regulations to the Board for consideration.

The table on the following page is an executive summary of the key elements for each type of Marihuana Facility for the Board to consider. The table includes he zoning districts and the permitted uses of marihuana facilities that are proposed to be permitted within each district. It also shows the proposed number of permits recommended for each type of Marihuana Facility and the primary siting controls recommended by Planning Commission.

The table includes the following information:

- The Uses column refers to the types of facilities are proposed to be permitted in each zoning district.
- The Zoning Districts column list all zoning districts marihuana facilities are proposed to be permitted in the Township.
 - Modifying which districts uses are permitted in is one way to limit the impacts of Marihuana uses on Township residents. The Board could provide Planning Commission with guidance on which districts should be considered for which Facilities.
- The Siting Controls column summarizes the locational siting standards recommended by Planning Commission be applied to Conditional Use Approval.
 - Modifying siting controls is one way to limit impacts of Marihuana uses on surrounding properties using zoning regulations. The Board could provide Planning Commission with guidance on modifying these r standards.
- The Business Permit column states how many total permits are proposed to be permitted with in the Township.
 - Limiting the number of permits granted is one way to limit total impacts of marihuana uses within the Township. The Board can modify permit numbers without Planning Commission review.

Please note: the permitting regulations are a Board action and do not require Planning Commission review. Planning Commission recommended procedures and a number of permits for each use and voted to forward these regulations to the Township Attorney for review prior to placing them on the Board agenda for consideration.

Tonight, the Board is considering the Zoning regulations, which control the districts where uses can be permitted and the land use standards that shall be applied to uses if approved.

The Board may make a motion to approve, request Planning Commission modify, or deny the Zoning standards.

MEMORANDUM: Marihuana Zoning Regulations

Dear Commission Members.

Per your request, we have prepared the following Zoning Ordinance revisions to accommodate medical and recreational marihuana uses in the Township. These standards are provided for your consideration and comment. If Planning Commission finds these standards to reflect the preferences of recent discussions, a Public Hearing must be scheduled prior to making a recommendation and forwarding the standards to the Township Board for consideration and adoption.

Please refer to the supportive memorandums and packet material from Planning Commission meetings on December 19, 2018, January 2, 2019, and January 16, 2019. This memorandum has been updated per Planning Commission comments provided on February 6,2019. Text that is struck through shall be deleted and text that is underlined shall be added.

A: RECOMMENDED REVISIONS TO ZONING ORDINANCE:

ARTICLE II. - DEFINITIONS SEC. 36-29. - DEFINITIONS.

Marihuana Establishments and Facilities: The term Marihuana Facilities, shall encompass all use classes specifically defined and authorized by the State of Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, MCL333.26421, et seq; the Marihuana facilities Licensing Act, MCL 333.27101 et seq; and the Marihuana Tracking Act, MCL 333.27901 et seq; and Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, MCL 333.27951 et seq, and all other applicable rules promulgated by the state of Michigan as may be amended. Marihuana establishments and facilities include the following use classes:

- (1) <u>Marihuana grower means a person licensed to cultivate marihuana and sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to marihuana establishments. Growers shall be subdivided into six classes based on State licensing standards.</u>
 - a. Medical Class A 500 marihuana plants.
 - b. Medical Class B 1,000 marihuana plants.
 - c. Medical Class C 1,500 marihuana plants.
 - d. Recreational Class A 100 marihuana plants.
 - e. Recreational Class B 500 marihuana plants
 - f. Recreational Class C 2,000 marihuana plants
- (2) Marihuana microbusiness means a person licensed to cultivate not more than 150 marihuana plants; process and package marihuana; and sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to individuals who are 21

- years of age or older or to a marihuana safety compliance facility, but not to other marihuana establishments.
- (3) <u>Marihuana processor means a person licensed to obtain marihuana from marihuana establishments;</u> process and package marihuana; and sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to marihuana establishments.
- (4) Marihuana retailer means a person licensed to obtain marihuana from marihuana establishments and to sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to marihuana establishments and to individuals who are 21 years of age or older.
- (5) <u>Marihuana secure transporter means a person licensed to obtain marihuana from marihuana</u> establishments in order to transport marihuana to marihuana establishments.
- (6) Marihuana safety compliance facility means a person licensed to test marihuana, including certification for potency and the presence of contaminants.
- (7) Provisioning center means a licensee that is a commercial entity located in this state that purchases marihuana from a grower or processor and sells, supplies, or provides marihuana to registered qualifying patients, directly or through the patients' registered primary caregivers. Provisioning center includes any commercial property where marihuana is sold at retail to registered qualifying patients or registered primary caregivers. A noncommercial location used by a primary caregiver to assist a qualifying patient connected to the caregiver through the department's marihuana registration process in accordance with the Michigan medical marihuana act is not a provisioning center for purposes of this act.
- (8) Registered primary caregiver means a primary caregiver who has been issued a current registry identification card under the Michigan medical marihuana act

ARTICLE III. - GENERAL PROVISIONS SEC. 36-64. - HOME OCCUPATION.

- (2) Medical marihuana cultivation, use and distribution <u>Licensed Caregivers</u>. In addition to the general standards as specified in subsection (a) of this section, medical marihuana, cultivation, use and distribution shall meet the following specific standards:
 - a. Conformance with section 36-729.
 - b. In recognition of the confidential nature of this use, a medical marihuana cultivation, use and distribution licensed caregiver shall make submit a zZoning eCompliance aApplication pursuant to section 36-729(c) shall be required, rather than a standard to obtain a Zoning eCompliance eCertificate.

ARTICLE VI. - AR—AGRICULTURE DISTRICT SEC. 36-157. - CONDITIONAL USES.

- (24) Marihuana Establishments and Facilities, subject to the standards of Section 36-761, including:
 - a. Growers, all licenses.

ARTICLE XXIV. - SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS SEC. 36-729. - MEDICAL MARIHUANA CULTIVATION, USE AND DISTRIBUTION CAREGIVERS.

(a) Intent.

- (1) It is the intent of these regulations to allow medical marihuana cultivation, use and distribution caregivers, as defined by the Michigan Marihuana Act, as a home occupation pursuant to section 36-64, and further to protect the health, safety, and welfare of law enforcement officers and other persons in the community. These regulations are designed to allow the creation and maintenance of a private and confidential patient-caregiver relationship to facilitate the statutory authorization for the limited cultivation, distribution, and use of marihuana for medical purposes; and to regulate around this fundamental intent in a manner that does not conflict with the Act so as to address issues that would otherwise expose the community and its residents to significant adverse conditions and the uninspected installation of unlawful structural, electrical, plumbing and electrical facilities mechanical equipment that create dangerous health, safety, and fire conditions.
- (2) These regulations allow for activity based on the Act. Nothing in these regulations shall be construed to undermine or provide immunity from federal law as it may be enforced by the federal or state government relative to the cultivation, distribution, or use of marihuana. Thus, the authorization of activity, and the approval of this use, shall not have the effect of superseding or nullifying federal law applicable to the cultivation, use, and possession of marihuana, and all applicants are on notice that they may be subject to prosecution and civil penalty, including forfeiture of property.
- (b) **Definitions.** The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this section, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this subsection, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Act means Initiated Law 1 of 2008 (MCL 333.26421 et seq.), and Michigan Administrative Rules, R 333.101 et seq.

Department means the sState dDepartment of eCommunity hHealth.

Distribution means the physical transfer of any amount of marihuana in any form by one person to any other persons, whether or not any consideration is paid or received.

Distributor means any person, including, but not limited to, a caregiver, patient or any other person, who engages in any one or more acts of distribution.

Facility or premises means one premises having a separate or independent postal address.

Marihuana means the substance or material defined in section 7106 of the public health code, Public Act No. 368 of 1976 (MCL 333.7106).



Primary caregiver or **caregiver** means a person as defined under MCL 333.26423(g) of the Act, and who has been issued and possesses a registry identification card under the Act.

Principal residence means the place where a person resides more than one-half of the calendar year.

Qualifying patient or patient means a person as defined under MCL 333.26423(h) of the Act.

Registry identification card means the document defined under MCL 333.26423(i) of the Act.

(c) Application requirements.

- (1) In addition to the requirements for home occupation pursuant to section 36-64 Home Occupation, a medical marihuana cultivation, use, and distribution caregiver shall submit a zoning compliance certification application must be submitted. The requirement of these regulations is to permit a location, and not to regulate persons. An application as supplied by the township shall describe each of the following and shall:
 - a. Not require the name, home address, or date of birth of a patient or caregiver.
 - b. Include the address and legal description of the precise premises, other than a patient's principal residence, at which there shall be possession, cultivation, distribution or other assistance in the use of marihuana. The fact that a caregiver or other person providing assistance to patients also has an ID card as a patient shall not relieve the obligation to provide this information.
 - c. Specify the address of the place where all unused portions of marihuana plants cultivated in connection with the use of marihuana or caregiver activity at the premises shall be disposed.
 - d. Describe the enclosed, locked facility in which any and all cultivation of marihuana is proposed to occur, or where marihuana is stored, with such description including: location in building; precise measurements, in feet, of the floor dimensions and height; the security device for the facility.
 - e. Describe all locations in the premises where a caregiver or other person authorized under the Act shall render assistance to a qualifying patient.
 - f. Specify the number of patients to be assisted, including the number of patients for whom marihuana is proposed to be cultivated, and the number of patients to be otherwise assisted on the premises, and the maximum number of plants to be grown or cultivated at any one time. If the location at which patients will be assisted is different from the licensed premises, the application shall provide the address of all such other locations (other than the address of a patient being assisted). The maximum number of patients and plants is specified in subsection (c)(2)b of this section.
 - g. For safety and other code inspection purposes, it shall describe and provide detailed specifications of all lights, equipment, and all other electrical, plumbing, and other means proposed to be used to facilitate the cultivation of marihuana plants as such specifications relate to the need for the installation of facilities. As noted in subsection (c)(2)d of this section, all new construction including structural, electrical, and plumbing, and mechanical shall meet current state construction codes and shall be inspected for compliance require necessary permits and inspections.

The standards of approval as noted below will be used to review each application. An inspection will be made at each location noted in the application to verify the standards.

(2) Requirements and standards for approval.



- a. Locations used for the cultivation and/or use of marihuana by caregivers and any other person permitted under the Act are pursuant to section 36-64 <u>— Home Occupation</u>. As a home occupation this use shall not be permitted under the following circumstances:
 - 1. Within 1,000 500 feet from sites where children are regularly present, and specifically a daycare facility, a church, synagogue, mosque, or other religious temple, and from a recreational park and a public community center, a public or private preschool, elementary school, middle school, high school, community college, and all other schools that have different name references but serve students of the same age.
 - 2. Within 4,000 500 feet of an adult use, as defined in this chapter, if applicable (attach appendix if not stated or incorporated).
 - 3. Within 1,000 500 feet from the site at which any other caregiver or any other person cultivates marihuana, or assists in the use of marihuana, not including a patient's principal residence which is not used to cultivate marihuana or assist in the use of medical marihuana for persons other than the patient at such residence.

Measurements for purposes of this subsection a. shall be made from property boundary to property boundary.

- b. The location of the facility at which a caregiver or any other person permitted under the Act cultivates marihuana, or assists a patient in the use of marihuana, shall not be the same facility at which any other caregiver or person cultivates marihuana or assists a patient in the use of marihuana. Accordingly, at a patient's principal residence used by such patient to cultivate marihuana for his personal use as permitted under the Act, there shall be not more than 12 marihuana plants being cultivated at any one time; only at a licensed facility may there be more than 12 marihuana plants being cultivated at any one time; and, at a facility at which a caregiver or any other person permitted under the Act cultivates marihuana for use by patients, there shall not be more than 12 marihuana plants being cultivated at any one time per patient, and in no event more than 60 marihuana plants being cultivated at any one time (which assumes cultivation for five patients), plus an additional 12 plants if the caregiver is also a patient that has not designated a caregiver to assist in providing medical marihuana.
- c. In order to insulate children and other vulnerable individuals from such actions, all medical marihuana cultivation, and all assistance of a patient in the use of medical marihuana by a caregiver, shall occur within the confines of a building licensed under this section, and such activities shall occur only in locations not visible to the public. This subsection shall not prohibit a caregiver from assisting a patient at the patient's principal residence or at a hospital.
- d. All lights, plumbing, equipment, and all other means proposed to be used to facilitate the growth or cultivation of marihuana plants shall be in accordance with all applicable state construction codes.
- e. Considering that the distribution of marihuana is generally unlawful, and that the Act authorizes caregivers, and does not authorize any activity such as a dispensary (authorized by statutes in other states), and reading the Act as a whole, the activities of caregivers are interpreted as being limited to private and confidential endeavors. Moreover, the location and identity of a caregiver is known to patients. Accordingly:
 - 1. Signage shall be in accordance with the township home occupation standards found in section 36-64(1)i.



- 2. Unless conducted as part of a related licensed professional medical or pharmaceutical practice, caregiver activity shall not be advertised as a clinic, hospital, dispensary, or other name customary ascribed to a multi-patient professional practice.
- (3) **Use of land in accordance with approved application.** If approved, all use of property shall be in accordance with an approved application, including all information and specifications submitted by the applicant in reliance on which the application shall be deemed to have been approved.

(d) Restriction on distribution.

- (1) The restrictions in this section are based on the following findings:
 - a. It is reasonable to expect and require that all undertakings of caregivers and other persons in assisting a patient are intended to occur on a confidential and private one-to-one basis.
 - b. The Act does not reflect the intent for distributions of marihuana by more than one caregiver or other person to one patient, or by one or more caregivers or other persons to more than one patient at any given time and place.
 - c. The confidentiality provisions of the Act reflect the intent for all caregivers and patients to remain anonymous in terms of their name and address, thus further reflecting the private and confidential nature of the activities contemplated between a caregiver and the patient he is assisting.

(2) Restrictions.

- a. A caregiver and any other person authorized under the Act to assist patients, if any, shall distribute medical marihuana only on a confidential, one-to-one basis with no other caregiver being present at the same facility at the same time, and no other patient or other person being present at the same facility at the same time; provided that a patient's immediate family members or guardian may be present within the patient's private residence, and one family member or guardian may be present in any facility other than the patient's private residence. For purposes of this subsection, the term "same time" shall mean and include concurrently as well as within a time interval of one hour.
- b. Considering the health issues presented, no food shall be sold from the facility used for the distribution of medical marihuana.
- (e) Inspection of patient cultivation. Upon the request of a patient who is cultivating medical marihuana, the medical marihuana officer Public Safety Director of the community shall confidentially coordinate electrical and plumbing any inspectors (and other inspectors within whose expertise an inspection is needed) with regard to the siteing of such cultivation for the purpose of determining whether all lights-structural, electrical, plumbing, equipment, and all other or mechanical means used to facilitate the cultivation of marihuana plants is in accordance with applicable code. In carrying out the provisions of this subsection, community officials shall not require the name and address of the patient. Rather, the intent of this subsection is to focus on the premises, and to ensure-fire, electrical, plumbing, and other safety for the benefit of the resident of the premises and others who may be affected by one or more code violations.

(f) Penalty for violation.

- (1) Civil infraction, with penalty of \$1,000.00 (or the maximum permitted by law if less than \$1,000.00 for each violation).
- (2) In the event of two or more violations, increased civil penalty (if permitted by law), and grounds for revocation, following hearing.



ARTICLE XXIV. - SUPPLEMENTARY REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS SEC. 36-761. - STANDARDS FOR MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS AND FACILITIES

- 1. These standards shall apply to all marihuana establishments and facilities, unless otherwise noted, and excepting caregivers, which are regulated by Sec. 36-729. Medical marihuana caregivers and Sec. 36-64. Home Occupation.
- 2. Marihuana related activities shall comply at all times and in all circumstances with the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, Marihuana facilities Licensing Act, the Marihuana Tracking Act, the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act and all State of Michigan regulations for the transfer of marihuana, and the General Rules of the Michigan Department of Community Health, as they may be amended from time to time.
- 3. All marihuana establishments and facilities shall submit a Zoning Compliance Application, shall obtain structural, electrical, plumbing, and mechanical permits and inspections to meet current state construction codes, and shall obtain a Certificate of Occupancy prior to any operation or occupancy of said establishment or facility.
- 4. <u>Site plan approval and conditional use approval shall be required for all marihuana establishments and facilities.</u>
- 5. The applicant location shall meet all applicable written and duly promulgated standards of the Township and, prior to opening, shall demonstrate to the Township that it meets the rules and regulations promulgated by the Medical/Recreational Marihuana Licensing Board and obtain a Certificate of Occupancy.
- 6. The establishment or facility location shall conform to all standards of the zoning district in which it is located.
- 7. <u>Establishments and facilities are not permitted within a 500-foot radius of any primary, intermediate or secondary school, measured by the shortest possible line from the property edges.</u>
- 8. The minimum distance from other marihuana facilities and establishments is 500 feet. This standard shall not apply in the WLD-NV, WLD-D, and WLD-W districts. Colocation of use classes on one site is permitted when consistent with State standards and permitted in the zoning district.
- 9. In the AR district, the minimum lot size for Medical Class B, Recreational Class B, Medical Class C, and Recreational Class C growers shall be 10 acres. In the AR district the minimum lot size for Medical Class A, and Recreational Class A growers shall be 5 acres.
- 10. <u>Hours of operation permitted for retail, provisioning centers, and microbusinesses: Monday Saturday: 9:00 a.m. 9:00 p.m.; Sunday: 10:00 a.m. 6:00 p.m.</u>
- 11. All activity related to the marihuana establishment or facility shall be done indoors.
- 12. All establishments and facilities must ensure that any water emanating from the establishment or facility meets or exceeds all applicable state and local environmental standards.
 - a. No required water supply and sanitary sewerage facilities shall be erected, altered, or moved upon a lot or premises and used in whole or in part for a marihuana facility unless it shall be provided with a safe, sanitary and potable water supply and with a safe and effective means of collection, treatment, and disposal of human excreta and domestic, commercial, and industrial waste. All such installations and facilities shall conform to the minimum requirements Washtenaw County, and any applicable statutes, ordinances, or regulations.
- 13. Security cameras shall be installed and maintained. All security cameras shall have at least 120 concurrent hours of digitally recorded documentation. The security cameras shall be in operation 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and shall be set to maintain the record of the prior 120 hours of continuous operation. An alarm system is required that is operated and monitored by a recognized security company. A security plan shall be provided and approved by the Public Safety Director.



- 14. Exterior lighting shall be required for security purposes, but in accordance with the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance.
- 15. Marihuana establishments and facilities are not permitted to operate in a manner that results in adverse impacts on adjacent property; including excessive odor, traffic, noise, or loitering. The Township may place reasonable conditions on facilities to ensure operation consistent with community norms. Failure to comply with Township regulations or conditions of approval shall be cause to revoke a local license. Odor for growers and processors shall be regulated as follows:
 - a. The building shall be equipped with an activated carbon filtration system for odor control to ensure that air leaving the building through an exhaust vent first passes through an activated carbon filter.
 - b. The filtration system shall consist of one or more fans and activated carbon filters. At a minimum, the fan(s) shall be sized for cubic feet per minute (CFM) equivalent to the volume of the building (length multiplied by width multiplied by height) divided by three. The filter(s) shall be rated for the applicable CFM.
 - c. The filtration system shall be maintained in working order and shall be in use. The filters shall be changed a minimum of once every 365 days.
 - d. Negative air pressure shall be maintained inside the building.
 - e. Doors and windows shall remain closed, except for the minimum length of time needed to allow people to ingress or egress the building.
 - f. An alternative odor control system is permitted if the special use permit applicant submits and the township accepts a report by a mechanical engineer licensed by the state of Michigan demonstrating the alternative system will control odor as well or better than the activated carbon filtration system otherwise required. The Township may hire an outside expert, at the cost of the applicant, to review the alternative system design and advise as to its comparability and whether in the opinion of the expert it should be accepted.
 - g. Secure transporters and safety compliance facilities shall also be required to submit plans for odor control for approval if in the opinion the planning commission such plans are required for the protection of the township and its residents.
- 16. <u>If the marihuana establishment or facility ceases operation for a length of time of ninety days or greater, the conditional use shall expire.</u>
- 17. Marihuana drive-through retail establishments and provisioning centers shall be prohibited.
- 18. All marihuana shall be contained within a structure that meets all applicable building code requirements in an enclosed, locked area. A floor plan shall be provided with the site plan application.
- 19. Application for a local Marihuana Facilities License shall be made to the Township Clerk upon application forms provided by the Clerk for Marihuana Facilities License and signed by the applicant verifying the truth and accuracy of all information and representations in the application. Applications including information and documentation provided pursuant to an application shall be subject to the confidentiality rules of the State of Michigan. In addition to information and submittals, the application shall include payment of application fee in an amount set by the Township Board. Applications shall be filed according to licensing regulations, procedures, and fees established by the Township Board, and may be amended.
- 20. A State license is required for all Marihuana Establishments and Facilities.
- 21. <u>Prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy for an authorized Marihuana Establishment or Facility shall comply with the following regulations and shall only be operated as long as it remains in compliance with all such ordinances.</u>



- a. Compliance with State and Township licensing requirements and proof of issuance of a State operating license and compliance with all rules promulgated there under is filed with the Township.
- b. <u>Compliance with all Township Zoning regulations with written approval of Zoning Compliance issued by the Township Zoning Administrator.</u>
- c. Compliance with all Township construction and building ordinances and applicable police power ordinances.
- 22. <u>Inspections may be made by the Township Official's designee to confirm the Marihuana</u>

 <u>Establishment or Facility is operating in accordance with applicable laws including, but not limited to, State Law and Township Ordinances.</u>
- 23. The premises shall be open for inspection upon request by the Zoning Administrator, Code

 Enforcement Officer, Building Official, Fire Department and law enforcement officials for compliance
 with all applicable laws and rules, during the stated hours of operation/use and as such other times as
 anyone is present on the premises.
- 24. The penalties and fees collected by the Township for Marihuana Establishments and Facilities shall be the maximum permissible by the State of Michigan unless otherwise established by the Township Board.

MEMORANDUM: Marihuana Permit Regulations

Dear Commission Members.

Per your request, we have prepared the following permitting regulations to accommodate medical and recreational marihuana uses in the Township. These standards are provided for your consideration and comment. Planning Commission is not required to make a recommendation or provide advisory guidance to the Township Board on amendments to the Township Code of Ordinances that are outside of the Zoning Chapter. Planning Commission may choose to make an advisory recommendation to the Board. We recommend these permitting standards for your review and consideration. If Planning Commission forwards these permitting regulations to the Township Board for consideration, it is our recommendation that Planning Commission also request the Township Attorney review prior to being placed on a Township Board Agenda.

Please refer to the supportive memorandums and packet material, and minutes from Planning Commission meetings on December 19, 2018, January 2, 2019, January 16, 2019, February 6, 2019, and February 20, 2019. Text that is struck through shall be deleted and text that is underlined shall be added.

RECOMMENDED REVISIONS TO CODE OF ORDINANCES

That the Code of Ordinances, Northfield Township, Washtenaw County, Michigan (or Northfield Township Code), is hereby amended by adding a Chapter, to be numbered 23, which such Chapter reads as follows.

Chapter 23 - MARIHUANA FACILITIES

Sec 23-1. - Legislative Intent.

The Township intends to issue permits for and regulate marihuana facilities to the extent they are permitted under the State of Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, MCL333.26421, et seq; the Marihuana facilities Licensing Act, MCL 333.27101 et seq; and the Marihuana Tracking Act, MCL 333.27901 et seq; and Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, MCL 333.27951 et seq. The Township does not intend that permitting and regulation under this chapter be construed as a finding that such facilities comply with any law. By requiring a permit and compliance with the requirements of this chapter, the Township intends to protect the public health, safety and welfare.

Sec 23-2. - Definitions.

(1) Words and phrases contained in the State of Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, MCL333.26421, et seq: the Marihuana facilities Licensing Act, MCL 333.27101 et seq: and the Marihuana Tracking Act, MCL 333.27901 et seq: and Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, MCL 333.27951 et seq.(State Marihuana Acts). This chapter contains some words and phrases that are defined in the State Marihuana Acts. As used in this chapter, they have the same meaning as provided in the State Marihuana Acts, except that if at any time the definition of a word or phrase set forth in this section conflicts with the definition in the State Marihuana Acts, then the definition the State Marihuana Acts shall apply. These words and phrases are as follows:

- (a) Grower means a licensee that is a commercial entity located in this State that cultivates, dries, trims, or cures and packages marihuana for sale to a processor or provisioning center.
- (b) Licensee means a person holding a State operating license.
- (c) Marihuana means that term as defined in Section 7106 of the Public Health Code, 1978 PA 368, MCL 333,7106.
- (d) Marihuana facility means a location at which a license holder is licensed to operate under the State Marihuana Acts.
- (e) Marihuana plant means any plant of the species Cannabis sativa L.
- (f) Marihuana-infused product means a topical formulation, tincture, beverage, edible substance, or similar product containing any usable marihuana that is intended for human consumption in a manner other than smoke inhalation. Marihuana-infused product shall not be considered a food for purposes of the Food Law, 2000 PA 92, MCL 289.1101 to 289.8111.
- (g) Microbusiness means a person licensed to cultivate not more than 150 marihuana plants; process and package marihuana; and sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to individuals who are 21 years of age or older or to a marihuana safety compliance facility, but not to other marihuana establishments.
- (h) Person means an individual, corporation, limited liability company, partnership, limited partnership, limited liability partnership, limited liability limited partnership, trust, or other legal entity.
- (i) Plant means any living organism that produces its own food through photosynthesis and has observable root formation or is in growth material.
- (j) Processor means a licensee that is a commercial entity located in this state that purchases marihuana from a grower and that extracts resin from the marihuana or creates a marihuana-infused product for sale and transfer in packaged form to a retailer or a provisioning center.
- (k) Provisioning center means a licensee that is a commercial entity located in this State that purchases marihuana from a grower or processor and sells, supplies, or provides marihuana to registered qualifying patients, directly or through the patients' registered primary caregivers. Provisioning center includes any commercial property where marihuana is sold at retail to registered qualifying patients or registered primary caregivers. A noncommercial location used by a primary caregiver to assist a qualifying patient connected to the caregiver through the department's marihuana registration process in accordance with the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act is not a provisioning center for purposes of this Act.
- (I) Retailer means a person licensed to obtain marihuana from marihuana establishments and to sell or otherwise transfer marihuana to marihuana establishments and to individuals who are 21 years of age or older.
- (I) Registered primary caregiver means a primary caregiver who has been issued a current registry identification card under the Marihuana Act, MCL333.26421, et seq.
- (I) Rules means rules promulgated under the Administrative Procedures Act of 1969, 1969 PA 306, MCL 24.201 to 24.328, by the Department in consultation with the Board to implement this Act.
- (m) Safety compliance facility means a licensee that is a commercial entity that receives marihuana from a marihuana facility or registered primary caregiver, tests it for contaminants and for tetrahydrocannabinol and other cannabinoids, returns the test results, and may return the marihuana to the marihuana facility.
- (n) Secure transporter means a licensee that is a commercial entity located in this state that stores marihuana and transports marihuana between marihuana facilities for a fee.
- (o) State operating license or, unless the context requires a different meaning, "license" means a license that is issued under this act that allows the licensee to operate as 1 of the following, specified in the license:
 - (i) A grower.
 - a. Medical Class A 500 marihuana plants.

- b. Medical Class B 1,000 marihuana plants.
- c. <u>Medical Class C 1,500 marihuana plants.</u>
- d. Recreational Class A 100 marihuana plants.
- e. Recreational Class B 500 marihuana plants
- f. Recreational Class C 2,000 marihuana plants
- (ii) A processor.
- (iii) A secure transporter.
- (iv) A provisioning center.
- (v) A safety compliance facility.
- (vi) A microbusiness
- (vii) A retailer
- (viii) A registered primary caregiver
- (2) Other words and phrases. The words and phrases in this chapter, as used in this chapter, shall have the following meanings:
 - (a) Applicant means a person who applies for a Township permit.
 - (b) Authorized person means:
 - (i) An owner of a medical marihuana facility;
 - (ii) The directors, officers, members, partners, and individuals of a medical marihuana facility that is a corporation, limited liability company, partnership, or sole proprietorship;
 - (iii) Any person who is in charge of and on the premises of the medical marihuana facility during business hours.
 - (c) Marihuana means "marihuana" as defined in the State Marihuana Acts.
 - (d) Medical marihuana home occupation means an accessory use of a nonresidential nature that is conducted by a registered primary caregiver who resides in the dwelling and (A) is performed within a single-family dwelling or within an accessory building to that single-family dwelling; (B) is for the purpose of assisting 1 or more registered qualifying patients with the medical use of marihuana who do not reside in the dwelling and (C) complies with the MMMA. As used in this subsection, "accessory use" has the same meaning as it does in Chapter 36(Zoning) of the Northfield Township Code.
 - (e) State Marihuana Acts mean the State of Michigan Medical Marihuana Act, MCL333.26421, et seq; the Marihuana facilities Licensing Act, MCL 333.27101 et seq: and the Marihuana Tracking Act, MCL 333.27901 et seq; and Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, MCL 333.27951 et seq.
 - (f) Permittee means a person holding a Township permit under this chapter.
 - (h) Facility means "marihuana facility" as defined in the State Marihuana Acts.
 - (g) Marihuana facility means "marihuana facility" as defined in the State Marihuana Acts.
 - (h) Township permit or, unless the context requires a different meaning, permit means a permit that is issued under this chapter that allows the permittee to operate as 1 of the following, specified in the permit:
 - (i) A grower.
 - a. Medical Class A 500 marihuana plants.
 - b. Medical Class B 1,000 marihuana plants.
 - c. Medical Class C 1,500 marihuana plants.
 - d. Recreational Class A 100 marihuana plants.
 - e. Recreational Class B 500 marihuana plants
 - f. Recreational Class C 2,000 marihuana plants
 - (ii) A processor.
 - (iii) A secure transporter.
 - (iv) A provisioning center.
 - (v) A safety compliance facility.
 - (vi) A microbusiness

- (vii) A retailer
- (viii) A registered primary caregiver

Sec 23-3. - MARIHUANA FACILITIES AUTHORIZED

Pursuant to the State Marihuana Acts, the Township of Northfield Township authorizes the operation in the Township of the following marihuana facilities, provided they possess a state operating license issued under the State Marihuana Acts and they comply with the additional requirements of this chapter 36, (Zoning), and all other applicable laws and ordinances:

- (i) A grower.
 - a. Medical Class A 500 marihuana plants.
 - b. Medical Class B 1,000 marihuana plants.
 - c. Medical Class C 1,500 marihuana plants.
 - d. Recreational Class A 100 marihuana plants.
 - e. Recreational Class B 500 marihuana plants.
 - f. Recreational Class C 2,000 marihuana plants.
- (ii) A processor.
- (iii) A secure transporter.
- (iv) A provisioning center.
- (v) A safety compliance facility.
- (vi) A microbusiness.
- (vii) A retailer.
- (viii) A registered primary caregiver.

Sec 23-4. - TOWNSHIP PERMIT REQUIRED, NUMBER OF PERMITS AVAILABLE

- (1) No person shall operate a facility for which an annual permit as provided for in this chapter has not been issued. The maximum number of permits available for each type of facility is as follows:
 - (a) Grower Facilities (20-licenses in any of the following categories):
 - i. Medical Class A 500 marihuana plants.
 - ii. Medical Class B 1,000 marihuana plants.
 - iii. Medical Class C 1,500 marihuana plants.
 - iv. Recreational Class A 100 marihuana plants.
 - v. Recreational Class B 500 marihuana plants
 - vi. Recreational Class C 2,000 marihuana plants.
 - (b) Processor Facilities (6 licenses).
 - (c) Secure Transporters (6 license).
 - (d) Safety Compliance Facilities (6 licenses).
 - (e) Retail Facilities (6 licenses).
 - (f) Provisioning Center Facilities (6 licenses).
 - (a) Microbusiness Facilities (6 licenses).
- (2) The permit requirement in this chapter applies to all facilities that exist on the effective date of this chapter or are established after the effective date of this chapter. This includes all persons who engage or have engaged in any of the activities that are included in the definitions in the State Marihuana Acts of the types of entities that may obtain a state operating license, without regard to whether they called or call their businesses "dispensaries," "cultivation facilities," "clubs," "cooperatives," or any other similar label. A person who engaged in any of the activities that are included in the definitions in the State Marihuana Acts of the types of entities that may obtain a state operating license before the effective date of the State

Marihuana Acts or before obtaining a state operating license does not have a vested right to obtain a Township permit.

- (3) The permit requirement in this chapter applies to all facilities whether operated for profit or not for profit.
- (4) The permit requirement in this chapter shall be in addition to any other requirements imposed by any other state or local law, including but not limited to state or local laws applicable to commercial entities performing functions similar to the functions performed by marihuana facilities.
- (5) The issuance of any permit pursuant to this chapter does not create an exception, defense or immunity to any person with regard to any potential criminal or civil liability the person may have under any federal or state law or Township ordinance.
- (6) A permit issued under this chapter shall be valid for 1 year after the date of issuance. To renew an existing permit, the permittee shall submit an application in the same manner as is required to apply for a new permit no sooner than 90 days before the expiration date and no later than 60 days before the expiration date.
- (7) Medical marihuana home occupations do not require permits.

Sec 23-5. - GENERAL PROVISIONS

- (1) A permit issued under this chapter is valid only for the location of the facility and type of facility that is listed on the permit application and is valid only for the operation of the facility at that location by the permit applicant.
- (2) A permit issued under this chapter is valid only if the permit holder also holds a valid current state operating license and a copy of the valid current license and application for license has been provided to the Township Clerk by the license holder and is in compliance with all other requirements in this chapter.
- (3) The revocation, suspension, and placement of restrictions by the state on a state operating license apply equally to a permit issued by the Township.
- (4) The expiration date of the state operating license that corresponds to a permit issued under this chapter constitutes the expiration date of the permit, however, operation of the facility under the expired permit is permitted to the extent that operation under the expired state operating license is permitted under the State Marihuana Acts.
- (5) A permit issued by the Township under this chapter, shall be conspicuously posted in the facility where it is easily open to public view.
- (6) Acceptance of a permit from the Township under this chapter constitutes consent by the permittee, owners, managers and employees to permit the Township Manager or designee to conduct inspections of the facility to ensure compliance with this chapter.

Sec 23-6. - Application requirements for and issuance of Township permit.

- (1) Application for new annual permit. An application for a new annual permit for a marihuana facility shall be submitted to the Township Clerk on a form provided by the Township, which shall fulfill all of the requirements indicated on the form, including but not limited to:
 - (a) The name and address of the facility and any other contact information requested on the application form.
 - (b) The name and address of all owners of the real property where the facility is located.
 - (c) Name and address of all business managers of the facility.
 - (d) A statement with respect to each person named on the application whether the person has:
 - (i) Ever been convicted of a felony involving controlled substances as defined under the Michigan Public Health Code, MCL 333.1101 et seq., the federal law, or the law of any other state and, if so, the date of the conviction and the law under which the person was convicted;

- (ii) Ever been convicted of any other type of felony under the law of Michigan, the United States, or another state, and, if so, the date of the conviction and the law under which the person was convicted.
- (e) Proof of applicant's ownership or legal possession of the premises.
- (f) A Township Zoning Compliance Permit.
- (g) A Township Certificate of Occupancy or Temporary Certificate of Occupancy.
- (h) If the application is for a grower's permit, the maximum number of plants that the applicant intends to grow. However, the application form for a grower's permit is the same regardless of whether the grower is applying for a state operating license for a recreational Class A, recreational Class B, or recreational Class C, medical Class A, medical Class B, or medical Class C license and 1 application fee for a grower's license shall apply without regard to the class of state operating license the permit application seeks.
- (i) Payment of a non-refundable application fee of \$5,000.00.
- (2) Renewal or amendment of existing permits.
 - (a) The same procedures that apply to applying for a new permit shall apply to the renewal or amendment of existing permits.
 - (b) An application for renewal of an existing permit shall be submitted no sooner than 90 days before the existing permit expires.
 - (c) An amended application shall be submitted under both of the following circumstances:
 - (i) When there is a change in any information the permit applicant was required to provide in the most recent application on file with the Township; and,
 - (ii) When there is a change in any information the permit applicant was required to provide in the most recent application for a state operating license on file with the state of Michigan.
 - (d) An application to amend an existing permit to change the location of the facility shall be submitted no later than 90 days before the existing permit expires. An application to amend an existing permit to change any other information on the most recent application on file with the Township may be submitted at any time.
 - (e) Applications for renewal or amendment of existing permits shall be reviewed and granted or denied before applications for new permits are considered.

Sec 23-7. - ISSUANCE OF PERMIT AND AUTHORIZATION TO OPERATE FACILITY UNDER PERMIT.

- (1) If the permit applicant has successfully demonstrated compliance with all requirements for issuance of a permit the Township Manager shall issue a new permit to the permit applicant if a permit is available or grant renewal of an existing permit.
- (2) The issuance of a permit under this chapter authorizes operation of the facility only after the following additional requirements are met:
 - (a) The applicant has provided the Township Clerk with copies of the applicant's application for a State operating license and the issued license, and a non-refundable fee of \$5,000.00
 - (b) The applicant has installed the following security measures on the premises:
 - (i) Security cameras to monitor all areas of the premises where persons may gain or attempt to gain access to marihuana or cash. Recordings from security cameras shall be maintained for a minimum of 72 hours and shall be made available to the Township Police Department personnel upon request.
 - (ii) A monitored alarm system.
 - (iii) A storage room for overnight storage of any marihuana product and cash on the premises. The storage room shall have only 1 door for entry and no other potential means of entry, lawful or

- unlawful, such as a window or crawl space, the door shall be equipped with a secure locking mechanism. Plant materials in grow facilities shall also be secured, as required by State Acts.
- (c) The applicant has provided the Township Clerk with a certificate signed by a qualified agent of an insurance company evidencing the existence of valid and effective policies of the following types of insurance, as well as a copy of an endorsement placed on each policy requiring 10 days' notice by mail to the Township before the insurer may cancel the policy for any reason:
 - (i) Workers' compensation insurance in accordance with Michigan statutory limits and Employers Liability Insurance with a minimum limit of \$100,000.00 each accident for any employee.
 - (ii) Public liability and personal injury insurance with minimum limits of \$500,000.00 for each occurrence as respect to bodily injury liability or property damage liability, or both combined.

 Documentation must explicitly state the following:
 - (a) the policy number; (b) name of insurance company;
 - (c) name and address of the agent or authorized representative;
 - (d) name and address of the insured;
 - (e) location of coverage;
 - (f) policy expiration dates; and
 - (g) specific coverage amounts. An original certificate of insurance may be provided as an initial indication of the required insurance. Applicant shall be required to continue without interruption during the term of the permit the above named insurance coverages. If any of the above coverages expire by their terms during the term of a permit, the applicant shall deliver proof of renewal and/or new policies to the Township Clerk at least 10 days prior to the expiration date.
- (d) Insurance companies, named insureds and policy forms shall be provided to the Township Clerk as defined in Sec. 23-7 (2)(c). The Township Clerk may request approval of documentation by the Township Attorney. Insurance policies shall not contain endorsements or policy conditions which reduce coverage required under the terms of the permit.

Sec 23-8. - Conduct of business at a facility.

- (1) A facility shall be conducted in compliance with the State Marihuana Acts, the rules promulgated pursuant to the State Marihuana Acts, and all other laws, rules, and regulations of the state of Michigan and the Township of Northfield Township.
- (2) All marihuana in any form kept at the location of the marihuana facility shall be kept within an enclosed, secured building and shall not be visible from any location outside of the building.
- (3) Marihuana facilities shall be closed for business, and no sale or other distribution of marihuana in any form shall occur upon the premises or be delivered to or from the premises, between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m.
- (4) An authorized person shall consent to the entry into a marihuana facility by the Building Official and/or designees and the Zoning Administrator and/or designees for the purpose of inspection to determine compliance with this chapter pursuant to a notice posted in a conspicuous place on the premises 2 or more days before the date of the inspection or sent by registered mail to the address of the premises 4 or more calendar days before the date of the inspection.
- (5) All security measures required in this chapter shall be maintained in good working order. The premises shall be monitored and secured 24 hours per day.
- (6) All marihuana in any form on the premises of a marihuana facility shall be marihuana cultivated, manufactured, and packaged in the State of Michigan.

Sec 23-9. - Prohibited acts.

It shall be unlawful for any person to:

- (1) Violate any provision of this chapter or any condition of any permit granted pursuant to this chapter.
- (2) Produce, distribute or possess more marihuana than allowed by any applicable state or local law.
- (3) Produce, distribute or possess marihuana in violation of this chapter or any other applicable state or local law.
- (4) Make any changes or allow any changes to be made in the operation of the marihuana facility as represented in the permit application, without first notifying the Township by amending its application.

Sec 23-10. - Permit revocation.

A permit issued under this chapter may be suspended or revoked for any of the following violations:

- (1) Any person required to be named on the permit application is convicted of or found responsible for violating any provision of this chapter;
- (2) A permit application contains any misrepresentation or omission of any material fact, or false or misleading information, or the applicant has provided the Township with any other false or misleading information related to the facility;
- (3) Any person required to be named on the permit application is convicted of a crime which, if it had occurred prior to submittal of the application, could have been cause for denial of the permit application;
- (4) Marihuana is dispensed on the business premises in violation of this chapter or any other applicable state or local law, rule or regulation;
- (5) The facility is operated or is operating in violation of the specifications of the permit application, any conditions of approval by the Township or any other applicable state or local law, rule or regulation.
- (6) The Township, the county, or any other governmental entity with jurisdiction, has closed the facility temporarily or permanently or has issued any sanction for failure to comply with health and safety provisions of this chapter or other applicable state or local laws related to public health and safety.
- (7) The facility is determined by the Township to have become a public nuisance.
- (8) The facility's state operating license has been suspended or revoked.

Sec 23-11. - Revocation not exclusive penalty.

Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to prohibit the Township Manager or designee from imposing other penalties authorized by the Northfield Township Code or other ordinance of the Township, including filling a public nuisance action or any other legal action in a court of competent jurisdiction.








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Colorado Cities That Banned Marijuana Sales are Regretting Their Choice

When <u>Colorado legalized marijuana in 2014</u>, they allowed cities to determine whether or not they would allow cannabis businesses to operate within their jurisdictions. But considering all the good things marijuana has brought for the cities that did allow legalization, many who continued prohibition of the drug are beginning to regret their choice.

Colorado Springs is the second-largest city in the state. Considering that it's a fairly conservative area, in 2013 the city council banned recreational marijuana sales. But now Colorado Springs is seeing how cannabis taxes are revitalizing other cities in the state and allowing major projects to get underway. It's also particularly hard for the city to see these major improvements in neighboring knowing that many of the customers who are buying marijuana are Colorado Springs residents. Colorado Springs City Council President Richard Skorman calls it "sales tax leakage."

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"People are going all over this state to buy marijuana and it's outrageous," Skorman told the *LA Times*. "It's already legal. It's in the state's Constitution."

A study conducted by a University of Denver professor estimates that Colorado Springs is currently losing out on about \$20 million worth of money because of their marijuana ban.

On the bright side for Colorado Springs residents, a change may be on the way. A group called Citizens for Safer Neighborhoods has organized a ballot initiative for next November that will allow the city to reverse the marijuana ban and begin to

reap the benefits of legalization. They need 20,000 signatures by this summer, but considering the support from the community as well as politicians such as Skorman, it will likely succeed.


Perhaps that's a sign for any cities in California, Massachusetts or other states legalizing marijuana about opting out of an industry that generates millions of dollars for local governments every year.

I again urge the Trustees to vote *in favor* of allowing dispensaries to open in Whitmore Lake. If we 'opt out' - Northfield Township will be *ineligible* to receive the tax benefits associated with legalization.

And while Tawn Beliger quoted a stat that said something to the effect of "70% of cities in Colorado opted out" - and we do have cities in Michigan opting out - again - we'll be ineligible to receive any benefits of tax revenue. I can cite a statistic too. The City of Colorado Springs, Colorado 'opted out' of having dispensaries. A study conducted by a University of Denver professor estimates that Colorado Springs is currently losing out on about \$20 million worth of money because of their marijuana ban. A quote from the study also stated: "People are going all over this state (Colorado) to buy marijuana and it's outrageous," "It's already legal. It's in the state's Constitution."

And it was mentioned that we 'opted out' of Medical Marijuana - and again - Tawn mentioned a study by U of M. From the study: "three-quarters of Michigan governments have chosen to not participate in the medical marijuana program, according to a survey from the University of Michigan.

I will - again - re-iterate! **That's far different than the WILL OF THE PEOPLE: 56 percent of Michigan voters said "yes" to recreational marijuana at the polls this past Tuesday, Nov. 6.** - with 2 out of the 3 voting districts in Whitmore Lake - nearly 70% of voters - voted *in favor* of recreational marijuana; that's 7 out of every 10 people - that voted YES!

And also - as my Wife - Dana - stated - we have personal experience with dispensaries - as our other tattoo shop: Lucky Monkey Tattoo - is right next door to a dispensary. It looks like any typical business; clean, well-kept, well-lit - NOT "shady "or dark. There are no under-age kids hanging around smoking weed. The dispensary is always busy - meaning that it drives traffic to the entire area; all of the stores, restaurants, and all of the other businesses in our area - benefit from this increased flow of 'customers'. There has not been 1 single disturbance or report of any crime - in the 2 and half years that we've been at our location next to the dispensary.

Can anyone attend committee meetings and speak freely during business or is it like board meeting with a call to the public only?



on Gura If prohibition of pot shops "for a time" is discussed, the prohibition should have a clearly defined timeline.

For example; "the city council votes to prohibit pot sales within city limits" and "the city council votes to prohibit pot sales within the city limits for 1 year" are two very different courses to take. The second leaves the city/township in a much better position to force a vote the following year to extend the prohibition or to let it die.

No one knows how this will shake out and what kind of potential revenue may be up for grabs. I'm only suggesting those in power consider not hamstringing the future of our town.

Timothy Lamb What potential revenue are speaking of? The state will collect sales and sin tax, but I don't see how that helps Whitmore?

Ion Gura Property tax, a buisiness would employ people, who would have a job and work here, so they would presumably spend money here. Pot tax collected by the through sales tax or otherwise would not be split with cities and townships that opt out. So if, like in Colorado, there is a surplus of money generated and the cities that are open to pot businesses start revamping schools and parks, we wouldn't see any of that money.

Jon Gura Timothy Lamb I meant agenda item 2b from the original post. Yes, a marijuana store. I thought that was clear throughout this discussion.



Perry Chapman Dana Forrester that's how this township control's growth and scares away any one interested in it. It's been this way for decades and it's shamful.

Jacki Otto Dana Forrester Planning Commission, DDA, Board of Appeals and ZBA are required boards of the township. The Parks and Rec as well as the Land Preservation Committees are optional. The PC develops ordinance and establishes zoning - then brings recommendations to the township board for approval. The DDA has a limited area where they receive a percentage of property tax to perform improvements. The Board of Appeals reviews property assessment disputes. The ZBA enforces the ordinance and provides variances to the ordinance - this is the only board that has independent authority from the township board. Each board have a specific purpose within the township.

Dana Forrester Jacki Otto Thank you for the explanation - I appreciate it.

Mark Stanalajczo Jacki Otto You forgot about the Board of Review, under the preview of the Supervisor, that is also a required board...that is held to review tax assessments for property owners.

Jacki Otto Mark Stanalajczo My mistake...I called it the Board of Appeals.

Janet Chick Dana Forrester Honestly over the 9 years I have been on the PC the only time (as I recall) we hear from the DDA is when we have a visioning session that includes the DDA District. Typically we solicit their input. The Zoning Admin we hear from quarterly in a report on denials or approvals of projects they oversee or when an issue consistantly occurs that the PC reviewing or creating an ordinance might help in resolving. A bigger issue is when an individual board member/s attempts to direct or influence the Planner or the PC to work on an item or move in a certain direction, Which is hard for me being a board member as well.

Mark Stanalajczo Dana Forrester Janet Chick is right about the issues of individual Board members influencing the PC and planners..it's happened for years mainly because the township board never worked as a group of 7...but only a couple of people "ran" things..and of course this leads to manipulation.



<u>Jodi Carbary</u> If people dont show up to this meeting and voice their opinion, some of our board members will continue to make poor choices financially for our township.





Seventy miles northwest of New York City is a hospital that looks like a prison, its drab brick buildings wrapped in layers of fencing and barbed wire. This grim facility is called the Mid-Hudson Forensic Psychiatric Institute. It's one of three places the state of New York sends the criminally mentally ill—defendants judged not guilty by reason of insanity.

Until recently, my wife Jackie—Dr. Jacqueline Berenson—was a senior psychiatrist there. Many of Mid-Hudson's 300 patients are killers and arsonists. At least one is a cannibal. Most have been diagnosed with psychotic disorders like schizophrenia that provoked them to violence against family members or strangers.

A couple of years ago, Jackie was telling me about a patient. In passing, she said something like, *Of course he'd been smoking pot his whole life*.

Of course? I said.

Yes, they all smoke.

So marijuana causes schizophrenia?

I was surprised, to say the least. I tended to be a libertarian on drugs. Years before, I'd covered the pharmaceutical industry for *The New York Times*. I was aware of the claims about marijuana as medicine, and I'd watched the slow spread of legalized cannabis without much interest.

Jackie would have been within her rights to say, *I know what I'm talking about, unlike you*. Instead she offered something neutral like, *I think that's what the big studies say. You should read them.*

So I did. The big studies, the little ones, and all the rest. I read everything I could find. I talked to every psychiatrist and brain scientist who would talk to me. And I soon realized that in all my years as a journalist I had never seen a story where the gap between insider and outsider knowledge was so great, or the stakes so high.

I began to wonder why—with the stocks of cannabis companies soaring and politicians promoting legalization as a low-risk way to raise tax revenue and reduce crime—I had never

Over the last 30 years, psychiatrists and epidemiologists have turned speculation about marijuana's dangers into science. Yet over the same period, a shrewd and expensive lobbying campaign has pushed public attitudes about marijuana the other way. And the effects are now becoming apparent.

Almost everything you think you know about the health effects of cannabis, almost everything advocates and the media have told you for a generation, is wrong.

They've told you marijuana has many different medical uses. In reality marijuana and THC, its active ingredient, have been shown to work only in a few narrow conditions. They are most commonly prescribed for pain relief. But they are rarely tested against other pain relief drugs like ibuprofen—and in July, a large four-year study of patients with chronic pain in Australia showed cannabis use was associated with *greater* pain over time.

They've told you cannabis can stem opioid use—"Two new studies show how marijuana can help fight the opioid epidemic," according to Wonkblog, a *Washington Post* website, in April 2018—and that marijuana's effects as a painkiller make it a potential substitute for opiates. In reality, like alcohol, marijuana is too weak as a painkiller to work for most people who truly *need* opiates, such as terminal cancer patients. Even cannabis advocates, like Rob Kampia, the cofounder of the Marijuana Policy Project, acknowledge that they have always viewed medical marijuana laws primarily as a way to protect recreational users.

As for the marijuana-reduces-opiate-use theory, it is based largely on a single paper comparing overdose deaths by state before 2010 to the spread of medical marijuana laws— and the paper's finding is probably a result of simple geographic coincidence. The opiate epidemic began in Appalachia, while the first states to legalize medical marijuana were in the West. Since 2010, as both the epidemic and medical marijuana laws have spread nationally, the finding has vanished. And the United States, the Western country with the most cannabis use, also has by far the worst problem with opioids.

Research on individual users—a better way to trace cause and effect than looking at aggregate state-level data—consistently shows that marijuana use leads to other drug use. For example, a

cannabis in 2001 were almost three times as likely to use opiates three years later, even after adjusting for other potential risks.

Most of all, advocates have told you that marijuana is not just safe for people with psychiatric problems like depression, but that it is a potential treatment for those patients. On its website, the cannabis delivery service Eaze offers the "Best Marijuana Strains and Products for Treating Anxiety." "How Does Cannabis Help Depression?" is the topic of an article on Leafly, the largest cannabis website. But a mountain of peer-reviewed research in top medical journals shows that marijuana can cause or worsen severe mental illness, especially psychosis, the medical term for a break from reality. Teenagers who smoke marijuana regularly are about three times as likely to develop schizophrenia, the most devastating psychotic disorder.

After an exhaustive review, the National Academy of Medicine found in 2017 that "cannabis use is likely to increase the risk of developing schizophrenia and other psychoses; the higher the use, the greater the risk." Also that "regular cannabis use is likely to increase the risk for developing social anxiety disorder."

Over the past decade, as legalization has spread, patterns of marijuana use—and the drug itself—have changed in dangerous ways.

Legalization has not led to a huge increase in people using the drug casually. About 15 percent of Americans used cannabis at least once in 2017, up from ten percent in 2006, according to a large federal study called the National Survey on Drug Use and Health. (By contrast, about 65 percent of Americans had a drink in the last year.) But the number of Americans who use cannabis *heavily* is soaring. In 2006, about three million Americans reported using cannabis at least 300 times a year, the standard for daily use. By 2017, that number had nearly tripled, to eight million, approaching the twelve million Americans who drank alcohol every day. Put another way, one in 15 drinkers consumed alcohol daily; about one in five marijuana users used cannabis that often.

Cannabis users today are also consuming a drug that is far more potent than ever before, as measured by the amount of THC—delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol, the chemical in cannabis

Americans used cannabis, most marijuana contained less than two percent THC. Today, marijuana routinely contains 20 to 25 percent THC, thanks to sophisticated farming and cloning techniques—as well as to a demand by users for cannabis that produces a stronger high more quickly. In states where cannabis is legal, many users prefer extracts that are nearly pure THC. Think of the difference between near-beer and a martini, or even grain alcohol, to understand the difference.

These new patterns of use have caused problems with the drug to soar. In 2014, people who had diagnosable cannabis use disorder, the medical term for marijuana abuse or addiction, made up about 1.5 percent of Americans. But they accounted for eleven percent of all the psychosis cases in emergency rooms—90,000 cases, 250 a day, triple the number in 2006. In states like Colorado, emergency room physicians have become experts on dealing with cannabis-induced psychosis.

Cannabis advocates often argue that the drug can't be as neurotoxic as studies suggest, because otherwise Western countries would have seen population-wide increases in psychosis alongside rising use. In reality, accurately tracking psychosis cases is impossible in the United States. The government carefully tracks diseases like cancer with central registries, but no such registry exists for schizophrenia or other severe mental illnesses.

On the other hand, research from Finland and Denmark, two countries that track mental illness more comprehensively, shows a significant increase in psychosis since 2000, following an increase in cannabis use. And in September of last year, a large federal survey found a rise in serious mental illness in the United States as well, especially among young adults, the heaviest users of cannabis.

According to this latter study, 7.5 percent of adults age 18-25 met the criteria for serious mental illness in 2017, double the rate in 2008. What's especially striking is that adolescents age 12-17 don't show these increases in cannabis use and severe mental illness.

A caveat: this federal survey doesn't count individual cases, and it lumps psychosis with other severe mental illness. So it isn't as accurate as the Finnish or Danish studies. Nor do any of these studies *prove* that rising cannabis use has caused population-wide increases in psychosis or other mental illness. The most that can be said is that they offer intriguing evidence of a link.

Advocates for people with mental illness do not like discussing the link between schizophrenia and crime. They fear it will stigmatize people with the disease. "Most people with mental illness are not violent," the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) explains on its website. But wishing away the link can't make it disappear. In truth, psychosis is a shockingly high risk factor for violence. The best analysis came in a 2009 paper in *PLOS Medicine* by Dr. Seena Fazel, an Oxford University psychiatrist and epidemiologist. Drawing on earlier studies, the paper found that people with schizophrenia are five times as likely to commit violent crimes as healthy people, and almost 20 times as likely to commit homicide.

NAMI's statement that most people with mental illness are not violent is of course accurate, given that "most" simply means "more than half"; but it is deeply misleading. Schizophrenia is rare. But people with the disorder commit an appreciable fraction of all murders, in the range of six to nine percent.

"The best way to deal with the stigma is to reduce the violence," says Dr. Sheilagh Hodgins, a professor at the University of Montreal who has studied mental illness and violence for more than 30 years.

The marijuana-psychosis-violence connection is even stronger than those figures suggest. People with schizophrenia are only moderately more likely to become violent than healthy people when they are taking antipsychotic medicine and avoiding recreational drugs. But when they use drugs, their risk of violence skyrockets. "You don't just have an increased risk of one thing—these things occur in clusters," Dr. Fazel told me.

Along with alcohol, the drug that psychotic patients use more than any other is cannabis: a 2010 review of earlier studies in *Schizophrenia Bulletin* found that 27 percent of people with schizophrenia had been diagnosed with cannabis use disorder in their lives. And unfortunately—despite its reputation for making users relaxed and calm—cannabis appears to provoke many of them to violence.

A Swiss study of 265 psychotic patients published in *Frontiers of Forensic Psychiatry* last June found that over a three-year period, young men with psychosis who used cannabis had a 50

psychosis who didn't use, even after adjusting for factors such as alcohol use. Other researchers have produced similar findings. A 2013 paper in an Italian psychiatric journal examined almost 1,600 psychiatric patients in southern Italy and found that cannabis use was associated with a ten-fold increase in violence.

The most obvious way that cannabis fuels violence in psychotic people is through its tendency to cause paranoia—something even cannabis advocates acknowledge the drug can cause. The risk is so obvious that users joke about it and dispensaries advertise certain strains as less likely to induce paranoia. And for people with psychotic disorders, paranoia can fuel extreme violence. A 2007 paper in the *Medical Journal of Australia* on 88 defendants who had committed homicide during psychotic episodes found that most believed they were in danger from the victim, and almost two-thirds reported misusing cannabis—more than alcohol and amphetamines combined.

Yet the link between marijuana and violence doesn't appear limited to people with preexisting psychosis. Researchers have studied alcohol and violence for generations, proving that alcohol is a risk factor for domestic abuse, assault, and even murder. Far less work has been done on marijuana, in part because advocates have stigmatized anyone who raises the issue. But studies showing that marijuana use is a significant risk factor for violence have quietly piled up. Many of them weren't even designed to catch the link, but they did. Dozens of such studies exist, covering everything from bullying by high school students to fighting among vacationers in Spain.

In most cases, studies find that the risk is at least as significant as with alcohol. A 2012 paper in the *Journal of Interpersonal Violence* examined a federal survey of more than 9,000 adolescents and found that marijuana use was associated with a doubling of domestic violence; a 2017 paper in *Social Psychiatry and Psychiatric Epidemiology* examined drivers of violence among 6,000 British and Chinese men and found that drug use—the drug nearly always being cannabis—translated into a five-fold increase in violence.

Today that risk is translating into real-world impacts. Before states legalized recreational cannabis, advocates said that legalization would let police focus on hardened criminals rather than marijuana smokers and thus reduce violent crime. Some advocates go so far as to claim that legalization *has* reduced violent crime. In a 2017 speech calling for federal legalization, U.S. Senator Corv Booker said that "states Ithat have legalized marijuanal are seeing decreases in

The first four states to legalize marijuana for recreational use were Colorado and Washington in 2014 and Alaska and Oregon in 2015. Combined, those four states had about 450 murders and 30,300 aggravated assaults in 2013. Last year, they had almost 620 murders and 38,000 aggravated assaults—an increase of 37 percent for murders and 25 percent for aggravated assaults, far greater than the national increase, even after accounting for differences in population growth.

Knowing exactly how much of the increase is related to cannabis is impossible without researching every crime. But police reports, news stories, and arrest warrants suggest a close link in many cases. For example, last September, police in Longmont, Colorado, arrested Daniel Lopez for stabbing his brother Thomas to death as a neighbor watched. Daniel Lopez had been diagnosed with schizophrenia and was "self-medicating" with marijuana, according to an arrest affidavit.

In every state, not just those where marijuana is legal, cases like Lopez's are far more common than either cannabis or mental illness advocates acknowledge. Cannabis is also associated with a disturbing number of child deaths from abuse and neglect—many more than alcohol, and more than cocaine, methamphetamines, and opioids combined—according to reports from Texas, one of the few states to provide detailed information on drug use by perpetrators.

These crimes rarely receive more than local attention. Psychosis-induced violence takes particularly ugly forms and is frequently directed at helpless family members. The elite national media prefers to ignore the crimes as tabloid fodder. Even police departments, which see this violence up close, have been slow to recognize the trend, in part because the epidemic of opioid overdose deaths has overwhelmed them.

So the black tide of psychosis and the red tide of violence are rising steadily, almost unnoticed, on a slow green wave.

For centuries, people worldwide have understood that cannabis causes mental illness and violence—just as they've known that opiates cause addiction and overdose. Hard data on the relationship between marijuana and madness dates back 150 years, to British asylum registers

in India. Yet 20 years ago, the United States moved to encourage wider use of cannabis and opiates.

In both cases, we decided we could outsmart these drugs—that we could have their benefits without their costs. And in both cases we were wrong. Opiates are riskier, and the overdose deaths they cause a more imminent crisis, so we have focused on those. But soon enough the mental illness and violence that follow cannabis use will also be too widespread to ignore.

Whether to use cannabis, or any drug, is a personal decision. Whether cannabis should be legal is a political issue. But its precise legal status is far less important than making sure that anyone who uses it is aware of its risks. Most cigarette smokers don't die of lung cancer. But we have made it widely known that cigarettes cause cancer, full stop. Most people who drink and drive don't have fatal accidents. But we have highlighted the cases of those who do.

We need equally unambiguous and well-funded advertising campaigns on the risks of cannabis. Instead, we are now in the worst of all worlds. Marijuana is legal in some states, illegal in others, dangerously potent, and sold without warnings everywhere.

But before we can do anything, we—especially cannabis advocates and those in the elite media who have for too long credulously accepted their claims—need to come to terms with the truth about the science on marijuana. That adjustment may be painful. But the alternative is far worse, as the patients at Mid-Hudson Forensic Psychiatric Institute—and their victims—know.

Below please find a description of each fund as well as any significant changes between the Fiscal 2018 - 2019 and 2019-2020 budgets.

GENERAL FUND (#101)

The purpose of the General Fund is to capture revenue dollars from Property Taxes, State Revenue Sharing, Cable Franchise Fees, Administration Fees from Taxes, Planning & Zoning Fees and Other Misc. revenue sources and apply those dollars to the operation of the township offices. Township departments supported by the General Fund are as follows: Township Board, Supervisor, Township Manager, Elections, Clerk, Information Technology, Board of Review, Treasurer, Assessing, Hall & Grounds, Legal & Professional, Planning & Zoning, Streetlights, Road Work, Solid Waste Management, Community Center, Recreation Board, Capital Outlay and Debt Service.

Items of significance for the General Fund

REVENUES:

- The Current Property Tax Revenue is based on Preliminary assessing estimates for the coming fiscal year.
- Sewer and Library Administration Fees have been increased to reflect increases in administration costs and the allocation of 10% of the Township Manager's wages and benefits to the WWTP.
- A Senior Nutrition GL line has been added to track income relating to the Senior Nutrition Program. It is offset by a senior nutrition expense line (101-666-822).
- The Community Center has been awarded \$91,000 for the Community Development Block Grant, which will allow for improvements to the community center building and grounds. This revenue account is offset by a community center grant expense line (101-666-929) which includes the Township Match of \$35,000.

EXPENDITURES:

Township Board:

- The Board of Trustees has asked to remove all membership dues from the budget and they would like to assess each membership as it comes up.
- People's Express was renewed for one year for \$10,000.

Township Manager:

- The Township Manager's salary is included at its current rate. Health insurance is increased at an estimate of 7% over the prior year and life and disability insurance are increased at an estimated 7.5% over the prior year.
- A 2.8% pay increase has been added for the controller and assistant to the township manager.

Elections:

- Election salaries are increased to reflect 22 election workers over 4 elections as we head into heavy election seasons which will include the Presidential Primaries. Election law also now requires us to have people on site to register voters through the day of the election.
- Supplies and Printing are each increased by \$500 to account for the heavier election year.
- Postage is increased due to prices for postage increasing as well as the need to send out more mailings due to changes in election law.
- Contractual Services has increased due to the need for extensive election equipment testing.

Clerk:

- A 2.8% pay increase has been added for the Deputy Clerk.
- Health insurance costs are estimated to increase by 7.5% over the prior year and life/disability insurance is estimated to increase by 7% over the prior year.

Board of Review:

- Board of Review Fees have been adjusted to reflect a pay increase to \$20 per hour to \$12 per hour.

Treasurer:

- A 2.8% pay increase has been added for the Deputy Treasurer and Front Desk Clerk.
- Hospitalization has been decreased to reflect changes in employee healthcare enrollment.
- No Contractual Services have been budgeted for the fiscal year, so those expenses have decreased by \$1,193 from last year.
- Miscellaneous expenses have been increased from \$500 to \$1000 to account for increased banking expenses.
- Training and Development Expenses have been increased from \$250 to \$500 to account for additional training for the Deputy Treasurer and Treasurer.

Assessing:

- The assessing supply line has been decreased to \$0. All office supplies are shared and should come from account number 101-265-727.

Hall and Grounds:

- Supplies have been increased by \$1,000 to reflect actual costs in the current year and to include all staff and contractors.
- PSB Maintenance and Operations Allocation have decreased by \$3,567 based on budgeted expenditures in the PSB building.

Legal & Professional:

- Other professional fees have been increased by \$1,000 to include \$2,500 for Barrry Lonik and \$1,000 miscellaneous.

Planning/Zoning:

- Recording Secretary expenditures were decreased by \$2,600 (27%) to reflect \$195 per meeting for 36 meetings.
- The budget for code enforcement uniforms has been decreased from \$2,000 to zero.

Street Lights:

- The cost of street light utilities is expected to decrease due to the improvement of efficiency. There was an upfront cost of \$22,008, which will be paid in the current fiscal year. Going forward there is an anticipated savings of approximately \$7,000 per year.

Roadwork:

- Pathways and sidewalks are anticipated to decrease to zero.
- Roadwork reflects \$28,000 for the townships share of three brine applications. Half is matched by the road commission.
- Road Improvements includes a \$42,000 match from the road commission. This includes the expected \$13,732 cost of drainage. The Township also has commitments of \$30,000 for the 6 mile culvert and \$21,000 for the Walker Drain Project.

Solid Waste Management:

- The Board of Trustees approved \$2,000 for the May/October Clean Up Program.

Community Center:

- A 2.8% raise has been included for the Community Center Director.
- Janitorial salaries has been increased by 2.8%.
- Hospitalization has been estimated to increase by 7.5% over the previous year.
- Life and Disability insurance has been increased by 7%.
- CC Trips and Programs have been increased to reflect increased participation. This is offset by anticipated revenue to cover a portion of these expenditures.
- The Senior Nutrition Line has been increased to reflect the amount of income expected through this program.
- \$91,000 has been added for the CDBG Grant for building improvements. Also included is \$35,000 to match the grant.

Capital Outlay:

- \$2,000 has been included for new computers for assessing and code enforcement.

The usage fee is to help cover the costs of maintaining the Community Garden, such as supplying mulch, soil, compost, water buckets and hand tools; purchasing building materials to construct and/or repair the garden boxes; and paying for any other maintenance that may be required.

As a member of the Northfield Township Community Garden, you agree to maintain the plot that is assigned to you. If you are unhappy with the plot that you are assigned, please contact us so we can help to resolve the issue. At the end of the growing season, it is your responsibility to clear out your garden plot. If your plot is not cleared out by November 1st, you will be charged a \$25 garden clean-up fee. Additionally, you will not be allowed to obtain another garden plot at the Northfield Township Community Garden until the garden clean-up fee is paid in full.

Date: April 18, 2019

Background

Northfield Township has recently received a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for \$91,286 for improvements to the community center. Those funds, together with the Township match of \$35,000, will be used for flooring replacement, upgraded parking on the north side of the building, installation of a hand sink needed to provide meals for homebound seniors, and new parking lot lights.

Because these are federal funds, the Township is required to have a Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment (ESA) done. The cost of the ESA is expected to be around \$2500 which will be reimbursed by the Washtenaw County Brownfield Redevelopment Authority (WCBRA). The Township will also need to obtain a radon test which is expected to be about \$300. The grant award may be adjusted to cover that cost.

I have contacted Quantum Environmental, Inc. who performed a Phase 1 ESA of the 2 parcels north of the Center which were purchased by the Township in 2014. The standard cost of such an assessment is \$2500. I have requested the 2 railroad easements be added to the assessment at no additional cost so we can proceed with acquisition of those parcels, too, as approved by the Board.

I am bringing this request to you so the application can be submitted for the next WCBRA meeting for approval.

I expect our attorney to review the contracts.

Action Requested

Motion to approve the application to the WCBRA Environmental Assessment Grant Program for a Phase 1 ESA at a cost of \$2500 to be reimbursed by the Brownfield Authority and authorize the Township Manager to sign the contract.

Motion to authorize the Township Manager to obtain a radon test for the Community Center at a cost not to exceed \$400.

RESOLUTION NO.18-598

A RESOLUTION OF THE NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP BOARD OF TRUSTEES. ESTABLISHING A POLICY ON TOWNSHIP INVESTMENT AND DEPOSITORY DESIGNATIONS

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of Northfield Township, Washtenaw County, in exercising its fiduciary responsibilities, desires to safeguard the funds of the Township that may be invested from time to time; and

WHEREAS, Public Act 77 of 1989, MCL 41.77, requires that the Township Board of Trustees designate the banks or depositories for the money belonging to the Township, including the time for which the deposits shall be made and all details for carrying into effect the authority given in this act; and

WHEREAS, Public Act 196 of 1997, MCL 129.91, et seq., requires Township Boards, in consultation with the Township Treasurer, to adopt an investment policy;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE NORTHFIELD TOWNSHIP BOARD OF TRUSTEES, That the following Resolution represents the Township's policy on Township investment and depository designations.

Section 1: Policy

This policy is applicable to all public funds belonging to Northfield Township and in the custody of the Township Treasurer, except for the employee pension funds and the employee deferred compensation funds.

The Board of Trustees approves the following financial institutions as depositories and investments of Township funds:

First National
CDARS
Michigan CLASS
Ann Arbor State Bank
Old National Bank
Huntington
The State Bank
Flagstar Bank

The Northfield Township Treasurer may invest Township funds in certificates of deposit, savings accounts, deposit accounts, or depository receipts of a bank but only if the bank, savings and loan association, or credit union meets all of the criteria as a depository of public funds contained in state law. The standard of prudence to be used shall be the "fiduciary" standard and shall be applied in the context of managing an overall portfolio.

The prior approval of the Township Board of Trustees shall be required for the Treasurer to invest in any other lawful investment instruments. The Township Board of Trustee's standard of prudence shall be the "fiduciary" standard, which shall be applied in the context of managing an overall portfolio. The Township Board of Trustees may authorize the Treasurer to invest in the following:

- (a) Bonds, securities, and other obligations of the United States or an agency or instrumentality of the United States that matures not more than 24 months after the date of purchase.
- (b) Commercial paper rated at the time of purchase within the two highest classifications established by not less than two standard rating services and that matures not more than 270 days after the date of purchase.
- (c) Repurchase agreements consisting of instruments listed in subdivision (a).
- (d) Bankers' acceptances of United States banks.
- (e) Obligations of this state or any of its political subdivisions that at the time of purchase are rated as investment grade by not less than one standard rating service.
- (f) Mutual funds registered under the Investment Company Act of 1940, Title I of Chapter 686, 54 Stat. 789, 15 U.S.C. 80a-1 to 80a-64, with authority to purchase only investment vehicles that are legal for direct investment by a public corporation. However, a mutual fund is not disqualified as a permissible investment solely by reason of any of the following:
 - (i) The purchase of securities on a when-issued or delayed delivery basis.
 - (ii) The ability to lend portfolio securities as long as the mutual fund receives collateral at all times equal to at least 100% of the value of the securities loaned.
 - (iii) The limited ability to borrow and pledge a like portion of the portfolio's assets for temporary or emergency purposes.
- (g) Obligations described in subdivisions (a) through (g) if purchased through an interlocal agreement under the Urban Cooperation Act of 1967, Public Act 7 of 1967 (Ex Sess), MCL 124.501, et seq.
- (h) Investment pools organized under the Surplus Funds Investment Pool Act, Public Act 367 of 1982, MCL 129.111, et seq.
- (i) The investment pools organized under the Local Government Investment Pool Act, Public Act 121 of 1985, MCL 129.141, et seq.

Decisions and actions involving the Township's investment portfolio shall meet the following criteria:

Safety: Safety of principle is the foremost objective of Northfield Township's investment practices.

Diversification: The investments shall be diversified by avoiding over concentration in securities from a specific issuer or business sector (excluding U.S. Treasury securities and insured certificates of deposit).

Liquidity: The investment portfolio shall remain sufficiently liquid to meet all operating requirements that may be reasonably anticipated.

Return on Investment: Return on investment is of secondary importance compared to safety and liquidity objectives. Investments shall be selected to obtain a market average rate of return. The core of investments is limited to relatively low risk securities.

The Treasurer may elect to have certificates and other evidence of investments held by a financial institution, provided that the financial institution presents to the Township Treasurer, on a quarterly basis, sufficient documentation and acknowledgment of the investment instruments held on behalf of the Township.

The Township Treasurer shall provide a written report to the Township Board of Trustees, on a quarterly basis, concerning the investment of Township funds.

All financial institutions with which the Township conducts business shall certify that they have received the Township's Investment Policy, have read and fully understand the Investment Policy, and will comply with Public Act 20 of 1943, as amended, and the Investment Policy.

Section 2: Miscellaneous

The Township will comply with all applicable statutes related to public fund investments. If any portion of this Resolution shall be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of any other portion of this Resolution.

All prior Investment Policy Resolutions, or parts of Resolutions inconsistent with this Resolution, are hereby repealed and replaced with this Resolution.
